RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch 2016

The annual survey, the largest of its kind in the world, took place on the 30th and 31st of January. The survey involved counting the different species of birds visiting your garden during one hour with the maximum number of each species seen together at the same time recorded.

At the time of writing over 180,000 surveys have been submitted, 293,000 people have taken part and around 6,000,000 birds have been recorded although all of the results are not yet in.

We are still waiting for the full results for 2016 and I will update you when these are available but **below are the 2015 top ten birds across the UK**.

And below our regional results from South Yorkshire.

My list from Green Moor this year is not typical of a suburban garden as we are fairly rural and some farmland species dominate a little more. Here are the results with count in brackets: ▶ Goldfinch (12), Tree Sparrow (11), Blackbird (6), Chaffinch (5), Siskin (5), Long-tailed Tit (5), Blue Tit (4), Greenfinch (3), Starling (3), Woodpigeon (2), Robin (2), Great Tit (2), Magpie (2), Pheasant (2), Dunnock (1), House Sparrow (1), Greatspotted Woodpecker (1), Lesser Redpoll (1) & Yellowhammer (1).

Lead Ammunition and the risks to wildlife?

The European Commission has announced it will continue allowing the use of lead in ammunition, despite it being responsible for thousands of bird deaths

Birds in Europe will continue to be put at risk from lead poisoning, as the European Commission today announces it will continue allowing the chemical's use in ammunition.

Lead ammunition use will be regulated on a limited basis under the EU chemicals regulation REACH (Registration, Evaluation, Authorisation and Restriction of Chemicals), despite it being responsible for thousands of bird deaths every year.

Under REACH, the use of lead in ammunition could be banned completely through a so-called "restriction process". Sadly the Commission has only chosen to focus on lead in wetlands, where a ban is already supposed to have been in place for many years. By taking this course, the Commission is ignoring the evidence of damage done by lead shots in other

habitats and by rifle ammunition.

Lead is highly toxic to birds and people alike. A review by the University of Oxford found that 50,000 to 100,000 birds in the UK alone die of lead poisoning. Ducks and waders often mistake lead shot (small bullets) for grit (the stones they eat to help with digestion) and die a slow and painful death from the toxic effects. £1,000 Reward offered as more birds of prey are illegally killed in the Peak District National Park

Derbyshire Police and the RSPB are appealing for information following the illegal killing of two birds of prey near to Glossop, Derbyshire. A £1000 reward has been offered by the RSPB for information leading to a conviction.

On September 09, 2015, a dead Osprey was found to the west of Derbyshire Level. A post mortem on the bird revealed that both its legs had been recently broken, injuries which were consistent with it being caught in a spring trap prior to its death. Ospreys are rare visitors to the Peak District and this one would have been on migration to West Africa.

On September 30, a buzzard was found shot dead close to Hurst Reservoir, only a short distance from where the osprey was found. This follows the shooting of another buzzard in the same area in March 2014.

Sergeant Darren Belfield from
Derbyshire police said: "I would appeal to
anyone who might have any information
as to who may be responsible for these
cruel acts to contact the police on 101. The
continued persecution of birds of prey in
the Peak District is totally unacceptable.
If you suspect someone of committing
any crimes against wildlife, act now. Your
call will be dealt with in confidence. If
you don't feel you can talk to the police,
pass the information to us through

Crimestoppers by ringing 0800 555 111." RSPB Investigations Officer Alan Firth said: "Yet again, we are seeing the senseless killing of fantastic birds of prey


in the National Park."

Last year, the RSPB published its annual Birdcrime Report 2014, which revealed Derbyshire as one of the worst places in the UK for bird of prey persecution. In 2014, the RSPB received 16 reports of bird of prey incidents in the county including a shot Buzzard, a shot Sparrowhawk and an illegally trapped Goshawk.

Green Moor's Important Geology

A new Regionally Important Geological Site (RIGS) has been allocated in Hunshelf. A RIGS is a good example of a particular geology, and our new one is the southern rock face in the Delph, Green Moor (photo), near to where the steps ascend to the Oxen pasture. It was chosen by a regional committee and is described as a: 'Good exposure of the Greenmoor Rock horizon. This site exposes the uppermost beds of the Greenmoor Sandstone in the type area. It was a site used in 2000 in research on the origins of Westphalian sandstones.' There are another two RIGS in Hunshelf, the original one in the back gardens of the houses on the righthand side of Stoneway Mews (although it is difficult to see the rock through the wire mesh!) and one in Stones Wood, Well Hill (on private land).

The parish council hopes to construct a footpath to the rock face, where a plaque will explain the geology. The site is at the top of the layers of Greenmoor Rock, which are about 100 feet thick in most places. In the Delph only about 30 - 40feet of rock were quarried, although elsewhere in Hunshelf (New Biggin quarry on Well Hill for example) they did extract almost all the seam. The Green Moor Rock was a result of deposition of very fine silt (average grain size 0.15 mm) over millions of years from a large, very wide river into the Pennine basin around 300 million year ago. It is particularly interesting that the accessory minerals in the stone indicate that these sediments (and source of the river) came from North America, and not from Scotland, as is the case of other local sandstones such as the (yellow) Grenoside sandstone. Apparently this large river does not have a name; so as Hunshelf sits in the centre of it: I think that from now on we should call it the Great Hunshelf River!



Parish Matters

Christmas "Do"

The parish council is very fortunate that a group of enthusiastic volunteers agreed to arrange a new, improved Parish Council Christmas event for all parishioners. This is reported elsewhere, but the parish council would like to thank everyone who helped in whatever way at all. The event sub group has been allocated a budget of £500 from our funds for next year, this together with the donations and raffle which together made £181, will go towards a similar event in December 2016.

Carol Singing Group

From strength to strength. The singers toured the parish and were welcomed at a number of homes. The singing at the Bridge Inn was also well received, and it is a little early, we commence practices in October! Our thanks go to all the organisers for their contribution to the parish. A new carol book of Green Moor Carols is in preparation. This is a major task, but it is hoped that it will be ready for the singers in time for Christmas 2016

Green Moor to Southwark

Green Moor stone is not only the bedrock of our parish, which was built on the need to extract this beautiful stone from the quarries all around the parish, it is nationally important. The Natural History Museum in London has a large amount of information on this layer of stone.

Two things follow. The first is that a group is actively looking at telling the full story of the stone from Green Moor until it arrives at the Green Moor Imperial Wharf in Southwark, London. This is an ongoing, long term project of which more to follow in due course. Grant funding has been sought and, in principle, agreed.

The second is that a well-known local geologist, Rick Ramsdale, is coming to Green Moor in the autumn to tell the story. He is very enthusiastic and there is talk of a "pie and pea supper" to go with it. More later.

RIGS Site

As part of the research into the Wagon Way and Green Moor stone a site in the

Delf has been identified as a Regionally Important Geological Site (RIGS). The grant application will cover making access to this site in a safe way. Perhaps we can also indicate the site of the "Sixty Steps Well" also in the Delf. The latter was more a deep quarry hole with access steps down, 60 of them? The "well" was filled in as a safety measure years ago and is thought to be under several feet of infill. There is no way we could excavate this.

Well Hill "Time Trial"

Another bump on Well Hill. Fortunately, nobody hurt, but a young cyclist ran into a stationary car. The parish council heard of a car, or cars, racing down Well Hill. Anyone spotting cars being driven too fast for the circumstances, should report it to the police. Then we found out that an "app" entices cyclists to time themselves between Green Moor village and the foot of Well Hill against others using the same software.

At the moment the speed limit is 60 mph. Most of us would think this is too fast for a narrow, winding lane bordered by stone walls and trees. Both of these are unforgiving if you lose control. BMC has been asked to review the speed limits on all the roads in Hunshelf and several roads in Thurgoland. We hope that common sense will prevail and a reduction in the limit enforced. Enquiries are also in hand about flashing speed signs.

Dean Head Lane

BMBC came, dug out all the drainage ditches at the side of Dean Head Lane. Unfortunately, the men were not aware of the culvert under the road. A resident, thank you, reported this omission and it was reported to BMBC immediately. Can someone let me know if the culvert is now clear?

Best Kept Village

Sad to say, the best kept village competition is no more. However, a group is looking to engender community activities with a view to entering a specific section of the "Yorkshire in Bloom" competition in 2017. The first community

activity takes place soon and is advertised elsewhere.

21 April

The Hunshelf Beacon on the Isle of Skye will be lit again as part of the beacon chain running the length and breadth of the U.K. It is Her Majesty the Queen's 90th Birthday. More details will follow when we decide on exactly what we will be doing. We await information from the Royal Pageant master, Bruno Peek.

Verges in Green Moor

Parish Councillors have spread the seeds of a semi parasitic plant that will retard the growth of grass to allow more wild flowers to grow.

The parish council is trying to raise funds to have the rest of the verge as far as the marker stone at the west end of the village laid with kerbs. No further progress as yet.

Web Site

This should be up and running by 31 March. The address will be <u>HunshelfParishCouncil.org.uk</u> but, and a big but, it will be under construction for some time yet. A fine example of watch this space!

Planning

Planning is a matter for BMBC, but as a statutory consultee, the parish council has the right to comment and object to application for planning. The Green moor Sports Club has put in an application for 40 foot high posts and nets along Hill Top Lane. We are waiting for a decision by Barnsley MBC

Analysis of the Parish Plan Questionnaire

Introduction

In November 2013 approximately 170 questionnaires were distributed and 50 questionnaires were returned (a 29% response rate). An analysis was therefore undertaken on these 50 questionnaires. Some questions had less than 50 responses as not all questions were relevant to all households .The key 'messages' from the responses are given here.

The Environment

The features which gave the highest number of very important or important for protecting in the parish were woodlands, hedgerows and footpaths Recycling, energy saving ,preservation of sites and allotments were rated highest for protecting and enhancing the local parish environment. Litter, vehicle damage to kerbs and removing dog poo were rated highest for making the parish roads, lanes and paths more attractive. There was 62% support for investigating roadside flower beds and 55% support for letting the roadside verges grow

Housing

62% of respondents said that the parish cannot accommodate more new housing. The highest rating for the type of housing needed was for local people. There was a spread of views about the appearance of new homes built in the parish in the last 10 years with the highest rating being 36% quite satisfied. The highest rating for various statements connected with any new homes was for 'new homes should have off-street parking'. 78% of respondents objected to new homes being built in designated green belt areas.

Transport and Roads

The main mode of transport for respondents was car/van, followed by walking followed by public bus .Vehicles were predominantly parked in a garage or driveway .Improved road maintenance and lower speed limits were the features most highly rated for improving road standards in the parish. The highest rating for the quality of the parish pavements was 'reasonable' Similarly the highest rating for the quality of parish footpaths was 'reasonable'

Leisure and Recreation

53% of respondents thought that there were sufficient outdoor leisure and recreational facilities in the parish. Teenagers were the group with the highest rating who would benefit from additional leisure and recreational facilities. Occasional talks, quizzes and concerts were the most highly rated for more social events and facilities.

Planning Matters

There was strongest support for Solar PV panels on building roofs and hydro power as means of installing energy generating mechanisms in the parish. There was strong'do not support' for windturbines . 64% of respondents either not supported' or 'strongly not supported' windturbines of any size. 80% of respondents thought that windturbines should be at least 1000 metres from the nearest dwelling (excluding the dwelling of the owner/developer of the turbine) and within this figure 45% thought this should be greater than 2000 metres minimum distance.

Security and Local Services

The highest rating for a variety of local services such as fire, ambulance, etc was 'no opinion/haven't used them'. The main concerns of respondents in the parish were theft or burglary, fly tipping, speeding and dangerous driving, inconsiderate parking and dog fouling. There were 29 comments on where in the parish this concern happens most frequently. Postal and telephone services in the parish were rated as the highest standard whilst mobile phone and internet were rated the poorest. The highest reported internet download speed was 2.0-3.0 megabytes per second whilst the slowest was 0.5-1.0 megabytes per second.

About your Household

Of the questionnaires analysed 21% were from west of Greenmoor village (Snowden,etc), 59% were from Greenmoor village and 19% from the east of Greenmoor village (Well Hill,etc)

What happens Next

This summary and a more detailed analysis was discussed at the Parish Council meeting in January. It was agreed we identify what might be done to address the main 'messages' whilst recognizing that not all can be tackled by the Parish Council alone. If anyone wants a copy of the more detailed analysis it can be provided by email.

The information from this questionnaire does provide the Parish Council with a view of the priorities of the parishioners and a really good 'evidence base' to represent Hunshelf views on planning matters to Barnsley Council.

John Maclaren Moffat 'Mac'

1 June 1943 - 9 February 2016

Mac was born in Halifax on 1 June 1943, one of five siblings. After leaving school he tried many jobs, many in uniform. At the age of 22 he walked in to the Northern General Hospital (then an ambulance man) where he met Maureen and was completely smitten. Maureen become his wife and they would have been married 50 years in June.

Mac leaves a daughter, two grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. Their daughter, Maxine and her husband Gary, had two children, Katie and David. Most of you will remember Marine David Marsh, who died in Afghanistan in 2008. David had a daughter, now eight and Katie recently had twins.

Although Mac and Maureen lived in Thurgoland at the time of his death, they had lived on Chapel Lane in Green Moor for 28 years and had been actively involved in numerous local activities. He had been a member of Hunshelf Parish Council, a member of Green Moor's Centenary Players, sang in Millhouse Green Male Voice Choir and played a large part in initiating the Millennium Green.

He is fondly remembered and will be greatly missed.

Hunshelf Hall Wall

If you were wondering what happened to the roadside wall at Hunshelf Hall, it was knocked down by a car. Fortunately, there were no injuries, but the car was badly damaged.

Local drystone wallers, the Fretwells have been engaged to rebuild, however, it could be a while before it is fixed.

Report Illegal Motor Bike Scrambling

It seems that our parish, like many areas around here, is now being subjected to illegal motor bike scrambling, especially in Tin Mill Rocher wood. Besides the obvious dangers to walkers and horse riders, this activity will destroy the bluebells, hopefully coming out shortly. Wharncliffe Estates, the wood's owner, is well aware of this and have reported it to the police on numerous occasions. It is difficult to stop; when Wharcliffe Estates block one entry point, the bikers, often in large numbers, break into another. The police have said that they might send their own police bikers in to intercept, but this depends on the 'frequency of the crimes'. All we can do - that on every occasion that illegal scramblers are seen, call 101, report the information to the police and get a crime number.

Another Local Walk



This area offers many opportunities for walks which include both extensive views and sites of historic interest. Lots of

possibilities are provided by Stocksbridge Walkers are Welcome. Many of their walks take in the Ewden Valley. For example, this circular walk, of just under 6 miles takes you from Parsonage Farm, onto Townend Common (a local nature reserve), past the Wantley Dragon, into ancient woodlands and past the (reputed) grave of a Saxon King, Walder's Low. You then return across Stocksbridge golf course. Included are extensive views and a number of steep ascents and descents. At one of the highest points on this walk, in July 1966, the BBC installed vans in order to relay the signal from World Cup football games

played at Hillsborough, the ground of Sheffield Wednesday. The signal was transmitted to the Emley Moor mast, near Huddersfield.
