# Nature Table



## AVIAN POX in Green Moor

I was having a session of photography on the back garden when I noticed something unusual about a Great Tit that was visiting the bird table. It was a juvenile with what appeared like large pink growths on its face and legs (see photograph).



After contacting the Sheffield Bird Study Group the bird was diagnosed as having "Avian Pox", a contagious virus/disease which affects a number of garden birds such as Great Tit, Greenfinch, Bullfinch and Dunnock. Please look at the following web-site which gives guidance on what to do in the event birds are affected in your area [www.bto.org/volunteer-surveys/gbw/gardens-wildlife/garden-birds/disease/avian-pox](http://www.bto.org/volunteer-surveys/gbw/gardens-wildlife/garden-birds/disease/avian-pox)

The disease is spread via insects, bird to bird contact or indirect contact and the advice is to regularly disinfect your bird feeders with diluted bleach (5%) or similar. I'm not sure how effective this would be as everyone in a particular area would have to do the same as birds generally move from one set of garden feeders to another.

## LOCAL ENERGY MATTERS

The project to investigate the potential for the river Don to generate hydroelectricity has advanced since I wrote the last Chat piece. We have investigated all the reservoirs which feed into the Don and Little Don, a number of local weirs, and some sites where, although the flow of water is low, it falls from a large height. The initial results

shows that a hydro scheme using the outflow from the Underbank reservoir is by far the best option, and would enable a community project to easily generate enough electricity (which could be used locally) to be viable. The energy group is currently trying to convince Yorkshire Water to co-operate with this.

A community benefit company, called Renewable Upper Don Energy, is being set up as the legal entity to take this forward. We are also looking at other energy issues: siting photovoltaic panels on unused land near Stocksbridge, generating heat using heat pumps in water courses,

especially the outflows from old mine workings. We also try to encourage local businesses, especially the ones moving into the new Fox Valley development, to use renewable energy. We seemed to have had a fairly good relationship with the proposed TESCO, with regards to energy issues. They were supposed to be committed to this and had been putting in their stores electric vehicle recharging points and biomass boilers. However, now we will have to be starting again with the new ALDI store; hopefully we can influence them.

## Stocksbridge Walkers are Welcome - Isle of Skye route

A walk from Stocksbridge to the Isle of Skye Quarry and Tin Mill ponds.  
Stepping stones on the route to Wortley  
Stepping stones across the River Don  
Length - 4.5 miles

### Description

A walk from Stocksbridge town centre up Hunshelf bank to the disused Isle of Skye Quarry which is being developed into a nature area. The route then crosses fields and passes through mature woods as it drops down to the River Don and the Tin Mill ponds. The route returns to Stocksbridge Town Hall by Ellen Cliff and the Ford Lane path through the demolished steel works.

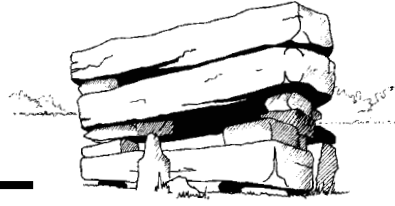

# Parish Matters



## Telephone Box

The telephone box in the centre of Green Moor is now under repair. Thanks to a grant from the Area Ward Alliance and some strenuous work by volunteers, Keith Pennington, Gordon Hodgson, Barry Tylee, Graeme Johnson, Wyllan Horsfall and Angela Fox among others, the old plastic bits have been stripped out and new "genuine" metal and toughened glass parts ordered and delivered. The new bits cost £1,085.88!

Once some holes have been repaired, the box will be professionally painted in true post office red ( Currant Red BS 381C-539 ) and the bits put back. The 'library' and notice board functions of this facility should be restored sometime in September.

## Verge

The roadside verge from Rock Cottage to the bus stop in Green Moor is now the responsibility of the parish council. Earlier in the year wild flower seeds were sown on this strip and we are pleased to say that the results have been spectacular! In the autumn it is planned to strim all the grass and strong herbage and then to sow some more wild flower seeds and seeds of a semi parasitic plant "Rhinanthus minor" or Yellowrattle. This plant lives on the roots of grass and should weaken the growth enough to allow the more delicate wild flower seeds to grow more successfully.

## Strays

Cattle have strayed onto the cricket pitch in Green Moor. Apart from the need to clean up the field before play can begin, a cattle hoof imprint could cause a cricket ball to rear unexpectedly and cause severe injury to players. We have many very young players in the Green Moor Sports Club and the thought of injury to one of them is very worrying.

We are not sure how the beasts got onto the field, but what is clear is that a gate was not only left open, but tied back.

Can we ask that any member of the parish who finds the gate onto the Isle

of Skye from Stocksbridge open closes it immediately? The gate is in good condition and has a fastening that is effective.

A wall onto the Isle of Skye that could possibly have been another access point has been repaired.

## Transparency Code

Last year new rules were announced for small parishes. Hunshelf is certainly one of them in normal times. These rules abolished external audit for those parishes if the turnover was less than £25,000 p.a. In return the parishes had to place online a number of documents by the end of July 2015. Funds and training were to be supplied!

On the 31st of July, i.e. the exact date we should have complied with this new edict we received a letter to say that training would be available next year and that funds would be given to buy a computer, scanner and a web site Ah well, better late than never I suppose. All I can say is watch this space.

## Superfast Broadband

Tranche 8: July to September 2017. This is when we might get an acceptable level of internet speeds in the parish. At least this is my home post code forecast. So, no hurry yet!

## Audit

I was mortified! The external audit informed me that I had placed grant income in the precept box on my annual return. For obvious reasons I try to stay on good terms with BDO our auditors, no use antagonising them in any way. So, I rang asking if they had an explanation.

The precept from Barnsley MBC comes to us as one sum. However, it includes monies that come into the borough council from support agencies. In some parishes this will be a significant amount, think unemployment benefit and rent allowances. For us it was the princely sum of £4, and as I had not been informed hardly my fault! Still rules is rules and next year I will be a little more careful or diligent. Not sure which.

## Christmas Event

Elsewhere there is an article about the new community event near to Christmas. Our thanks go to all the willing volunteers who have already put in a tremendous amount of work on this project.

## Footpaths

If you know of any footpaths or stiles that need attention, would you please let me or one of the parish councillors know? We have been informed about one popular footpath that has been blocked to allow pheasant rearing. We are trying to get this re-opened, but it is NOT a definitive footpath so we are only able to rely on the goodwill of the landowner. We are aware of one stile that needs repairing and that is being reported to Barnsley MBC.

## Playground

By the time this gets published the rear wall of the playground should have been repaired. We apologise for the inconvenience caused to users of the playground (particularly in the school holidays) but we are trying to ensure the safety of users in the future. The wall concerned is not dangerous, but does need attention and work on walls and children using the playground do not mix.

Our thanks go to Barry Tylee for scrubbing all the playground equipment and dealing with the weeds encroaching on the rubber surface.

## MBE

I am honoured to know that I was nominated by the community in Hunshelf for the award of an MBE in the Queen's Birthday Honours List. I am sure that many, many others deserve this kind of recognition for their work, but I am fortunate that I live in a community that cares. Also, without my wife supporting me in everything I do, it could not have been possible. My grateful thanks to you all.
